#### **Office of College Relations recognized**

The work of Randolph College's Office of College Relations received seven awards, including a Best in Show, from the Annual Educational Advertising Awards and five awards from the Collegiate Advertising Awards. Randolph was one of just 16 schools nationwide to be recognized with a Best in Show award from the Annual Educational Advertising Awards, the oldest, largest, and most respected educational advertising awards competition in the nation. Other recipients included large schools like Rutgers, Clemson, the University of Louisville, and Auburn University.

#### Princeton Review recognizes Randolph professors

The Princeton Review ranked Randolph College 23rd for most accessible professors in the 2024 edition of its college guide, *The Best 389 Colleges*. Randolph was also ranked 22nd for Best Health Services and was singled out as one of the Best Mid-Atlantic institutions in the 2024 Best Colleges: Region by Region web feature recognizing colleges that are academically outstanding. Additionally, the College continued its tradition of being named one of The Princeton Review's Green Colleges.

## Randolph student presents during VFIC business meeting

**E** va Pontius Hey '23 presented on Randolph's climate resilience work at the Virginia Foundation for Independent Colleges' (VFIC) annual business meeting in June. Her talk focused on the climate resilient food forest she designed for R.S. Payne Elementary School. The work was a result of VFIC's Heat Watch Project, which surveyed temperatures in Lynchburg during the summer of 2021 to identify neighborhoods with higher temperatures than others. Hey worked with Randolph professor Karin Warren last summer to research food forests, and using the Heat Watch data, identify possible locations for the project.

#### Giovanni announced as Commencement speaker

Nactivist, and educator, will serve as Randolph College's 2024 Commencement speaker on Sunday, May 5, 2024. A leader in



the Black Arts Movement, Giovanni has published numerous collections of poetry, written several works of nonfiction and children's literature, and taught all over the country, most recently at Virginia Tech, where she was named a University Distinguished Professor in 1999. She is also the recipient of a wide range of awards, including the 2022 Ruth Lilly Poetry Prize, the inaugural

Rosa L. Parks Woman of Courage Award, the American Book Award, the Langston Hughes Award, the Virginia Governor's Award for the Arts, the Emily Couric Leadership Award, and a Literary Excellence Award.

#### College exceeds Annual Fund goal for FY 2022-23

Randolph College exceeded its Annual Fund goal for the 2022-23 fiscal year, ending with a total of more than \$2 million. Total giving to the College exceeded \$6.3 million from more than 2,600 donors. Student scholarships, capital improvements, academic resources, diversity and inclusion initiatives, and new graduate programs were also made possible by these donors. In addition, the College is moving into the last stages of its Martin Science Building revitalization fundraising campaign.



#### Randolph announces two new sports

Randolph College announced the addition of its 21st and 22nd varsity athletics teams this summer. Women's and men's wrestling will join the WildCats lineup for the 2024-25 academic year, competing in the NCAA Division III. Randolph is finalizing plans to use nearby off-campus facilities for the wrestling teams and has hired the head coaches.



#### Randolph named one of nation's 'best and most interesting institutions'

The Fiske Guide to Colleges once again recognized Randolph as one of the nation's "best and most interesting institutions." The 2024 edition of the guide praised Randolph for offering students a place to be themselves while earning a strong liberal arts education. Randolph's unique offerings-the American Culture Program, \$2,000 RISE grants, the Summer Research Program, and Honor Code-were among the reasons why Fiske recognized the College again this year, in addition to its rigorous academic programs, close community, picturesque campus, and rich traditions.

# New program allows students to start college sooner

Randolph launched a new program this fall that provides students with an easier and faster way to transfer or enter college. Under the new plan, students were able to enroll for the beginning of Session 2 in October. Most colleges make students wait until the next semester to transfer or enroll. "Because of the innovation of TAKE2, Randolph's curriculum model, students here take two classes at a time for seven weeks," said Gary Dop, dean of innovation. "The uniqueness of this method allows us to offer this unusual enrollment option for students."



## Pearl S. Buck Award to be reinstituted this spring

Jetsun Pema, the younger sister of His Holiness the 14th Dalai Lama, will be the recipient of Randolph College's Pearl S. Buck Award, which is given to women who exemplify the ideals, values, and commitments of Buck, a member of the Class of 1914 and the first American woman to receive the Nobel Prize for Literature. Pema, who has dedicated her life to educating Tibetan children in exile, will receive the award during a ceremony on April 18. She is the seventh recipient of Randolph's award.

#### \$300K raised during annual Give Day

Randolph College's Give Day brought in more than 650 Annual Fund gifts totaling over \$300,000 and counting–including more than \$80,000 matched by donors. It was the College's third time hosting its own unique day of giving in support of the Annual Fund, which provides vital, unrestricted support for the student experience at Randolph. This year, gifts came from 45 states and 16 countries. The classes with the most donors were 1978, 1965, 1968, and 1969.



#### College stages 2023 Greek Play, Euripides' 'lon'

The College's Greek Play tradition–which dates back to 1909–continued this fall with October performances of Euripides' *Ion*. Amy R. Cohen, classics professor and Randolph's Catherine Ehrman Thoresen '23 and William E. Thoresen Chair of Speech and Theatre, directed the play, with music direction by music professor Randall Speer and choreography by Mitchell Ngwenya '25.



# **Professor, students travel to Nepal for ASIANetwork-funded research**

Suzanne Bessenger, Randolph's Barbara Boyle Lemon '57 and William J. Lemon Associate Professor of Religious Studies, and Presidential Fellow Liz Perry-Sizemore led three students on a trip to Nepal last spring, funded by a Freeman Student-Faculty Fellowship awarded by ASIANetwork. Delaney Scott '23, Jordyn Shumpert '25, and Kai Miller '24, all comparative philosophy majors, joined Bessenger in researching women's empowerment, education, and feminism in the Buddhist world. Randolph President Sue Ott Rowlands also joined the group to meet area alumnae and families.

# Supportive Second

MFA in Theatre program kicks off first session

The inaugural class of Randolph College's Master of Fine Arts in Theatre program had its first on-campus residency in July. The program was made possible in part from a leadership donor, Dorothy Orgill Kirsch '55

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The laughter rose from the small crowd gathered in Randolph's Student Center late one evening in mid-July. Applause soon followed as the audience showed their admiration for a series of short performances that marked the conclusion of the first residency for the College's new Master of Fine Arts in Theatre program.

Students in the program's first cohort gathered at Randolph this summer for a week of workshops, mentoring sessions with faculty members, and various social events, as well as rehearsals for the scenes they would eventually present.

"The opportunities that have come from this week have changed the trajectory of my life," said Georgia Tsolakis '25 MFA, who directed one of the scenes. "I've learned so much."

Tsolakis, who graduated from college in 2021, is a scenic designer by trade and came straight to the program from a gig with an opera company in Utah.

"The low-residency part interested me," Tsolakis said, "as well as the personalized track and mentor-mentee relationships."

The two-year program includes five residencies on campus and four semesters of virtual classes along with one-on-one faculty mentorship.

That format is also what attracted Rebekah Martin '25 MFA, technical director of theatre and music at the University of Arkansas Fort Smith.

Martin is exactly the kind of student the MFA program was designed for–working and aspiring theatre artists, educators, and leaders.

She is also an adjunct professor and mom of three. Thanks to the program, she's able to pursue her passions without uprooting her family.

"This program just really spoke to me," said Martin, who is on the MFA's directing track.

Students in the program can choose from three tracks–acting, directing, or design– though many have chosen to pursue two tracks during their two years of training.

"In theatre, there's rarely ever just one thing to do," Martin said. "You get called to do everything."

The ultimate goal of the program, which will continue with residencies in January and June, is to help students develop their individual artistry and leadership through advanced, specialized training in acting, directing, design, producing, and management.

During the July residency, faculty members led sessions on topics ranging from storytelling to branding and identity to building safety in theatrical spaces. The week also included a film and TV panel, an on-camera audition intensive, faculty/mentor meetings, and other events.

"It was so wonderful to see the faculty and students connecting and forging those bonds," said Stephanie Earl, director of the MFA program. "It reinforced that we found the right people, individuals who are open, kind, and supportive."

Each residency is followed by a 20-week semester that includes an online class in diversity, equity, and inclusion "tied to our mission of theatre for the modern world," said Ally Farzetta, assistant director of the MFA program.

Students also spend that time workingvirtually with their faculty mentor while pursuing a project that fits into their goals as theatre practitioners. Harper Whetzel '23, '25 MFA wrote, produced, directed, edited, and starred in a short film that will be shown on campus.

Whetzel called the virtual mentoring a unique and remarkable experience that has helped her build a professional portfolio and website and added to her acting reel.

"My mentor and I try to meet twice a month," she said. "We talk about readings I've done, watch videos of my recent work, and talk about my semester project and what next steps should be taken. It's gone exceptionally well."

Fellow student Gordon (Toby) Emert, Jr. '25 MFA, has also been immersed in his work since the summer residency. He directed a staged reading this fall, and following January's residency, will direct an original musical he's writing with support from a National Endowment for the Arts Research in the Arts Grant based on the podcast, *Million Bazillion*.

"I needed a program that would support the work I'm already doing," said Emert, a theatre professor at Agnes Scott College who holds a variety of degrees, including a PhD from the University of Virginia.

Support is the right word, and one the students used often as they praised the collaborative nature of the program.

And it wasn't just the students who walked away from the first residency feeling energized.

"We all have a voice at the table," said faculty member Karl O'Brian Williams, an actor, playwright, producer, director, and educator. "It doesn't feel hierarchical. I'm bonding with people and feeling love and connections that I don't get everywhere. I feel seen, loved, and appreciated."



# POLITICALLY FARGED

Jaelyn Evans '22 is no stranger to the halls of Congress, a place she's called her work home since graduating from Randolph College.

But, not too long ago, she found herself rubbing shoulders with political leaders in a different setting—the White House Congressional Picnic.

"It was incredible, walking up to huge names like Nancy Pelosi and Hakeem Jeffries to say, 'Hi, I love your work,'" said Evans, who posed for photos with both Democratic leaders, as well as President Joe Biden, at the event. "I've gotten used to working alongside congresspeople, seeing them in the hallways. But it was so interesting to go to the picnic and see them in a completely different light."

Evans, who majored in political science, began her career on Capitol Hill during the fall of 2022 with an internship in the office of U.S. Rep. Mike Quigley (D-IL).

It was something of a full-circle moment for the Chicago native, who had actually visited Quigley's office as a young teen.

"I always had Congress in the back of my mind, so I started applying to jobs and internships on the Hill, and Congressman Quigley's office was one I was excited about," she said. "He represents the North Side of Chicago. I'm from the South Side, but we're all one big constituency."

As an intern, she fielded calls from constituents and led tours of the Capitol, something she felt prepared for thanks to her time as a Gold Key Guide at Randolph.

The tours also helped her maintain perspective on the unique position she's in.

"They're seeing it for the first time, in awe and taking photos," she said. "It's a good reminder that this is really cool, and we should remember that. It makes you appreciate where you work."

After two months as an intern, Evans took a job as a staff assistant with U.S. Rep Gerald E. Connolly (D-VA) before returning to Quigley's office this February in a similar role.

She now oversees his internship program, helping students whose shoes she once filled herself. She's also flexed her legislative muscles by working on memos with Quigley's team. One of her favorite parts of the job is the work she's able to do with the Honor Flight Network, a national nonprofit that works to bring United States military veterans to Washington, D.C., to visit memorials dedicated to their service and sacrifices.

"We print out a Congressional record acknowledging their visit and thanking them for their service," Evans said. "I get to drive those over to the monuments on those days."

The leadership opportunities she had at Randolph–serving as Student Government president, among them–have played a big role in her work.

"It's also helped me just in thinking on my feet," she said. "As SG president, there were many things that happened quickly, and I had to adjust, particularly serving as president the first year we came back post-Covid. I learned a lot about being flexible and doing things in a different way than anyone had ever done them before."

Quigley encourages his staffers to hang up pennants from their alma maters in his office and proudly points them out when high school students visit.

Now, thanks to Evans, a whole new generation of students are finding out what it means to Be An Original.

"My desk is the first one people see as they walk into his office, and I have a giant Randolph College pennant," she said. "There are a lot of students discovering Randolph."

R andolph College has always been known as a pioneer.

At a time when most women were not educated in the sciences, the College offered courses in physics, astronomy, biology, chemistry, and more—with "equipment as complete as may be found in the best colleges for men in any section of the country," according to the local newspaper circa 1898.

Times and technology have changed, but Randolph's commitment to offering the next generation of scientists a strong liberal arts education has not.

As part of that commitment, the College relaunched its Science Matters campaign for the renovation and revitalization of the historic Martin Science Building.

This milestone event in Randolph's history was celebrated at a special event in October, where the campus community was joined by the College's Board of Trustees, local leaders, and area alumni.

"To attract and retain the most academically talented students and to keep pace with the scientific advances that drive the curriculum in contemporary college science programs, our Martin Science Building must reflect Randolph's rich history and the high academic caliber of our current endeavors," said Randolph President Sue Ott Rowlands.

"Modern science labs are designed for collaboration to allow for better communication during lectures or research. Maker education, the process of learning through creativity, interdisciplinary




An architect's rendering of a new space in Martin Science Building





concepts, and experimentation are all in high demand. In contrast to Martin's enclosed corridors, an ideal building design features light and open spaces that facilitate interaction between students and faculty," she added.

Built in the late 1930s and named in memory of Fernando Wood Martin, the first scientist on the College's faculty, the 38,000-square-foot Martin Science Building provides a historic setting for Randolph students and faculty.

The upgrades will be an invaluable resource for students in the College's biology, chemistry, physics and engineering, math and computer science, marine science, and environmental studies and sciences programs, as well as the Natural History and Archaeology Collections Project.

While primarily remaining true to

its original architecture, the building will undergo an interior transformation, becoming a welcoming space that inspires communication, curiosity, discovery, and innovation.

Renovations will bring the building up to current standards, resulting in a place that is more comfortable and fully accessible, with better climate control, lighting, and campus integration.

With the addition of the modern technological and scientific resources expected by today's faculty and students, the new facility will highlight Randolph's passion for the sciences.

Renovations will begin in January 2024, and the new building is expected to be ready by fall 2025.

Though the project's original public launch was stalled due to the pandemic, the

enthusiasm for the project has remained strong.

The College has already received approximately \$16.4 million in gifts and pledges toward the project goal of \$23 million and estimates receiving \$3.7 million in state historic tax credits, leaving \$2.9 million needed to complete the campaign.

The Mary Morton Parsons Foundation also notified Randolph that this project is eligible for a matching grant opportunity in the amount of \$250,000. Randolph is required to meet the match by May 2024.

# PAGES of HISTORY

### College partners with Lynchburg Public Library to explore legacies of slavery

The ledger book-kept by Seth Woodroof, a known Lynchburg slave trader in the 1830s-was a rare find.

Found in the collection of Jones Memorial Library in Lynchburg, it detailed information about the enslaved people Woodroof sold.

"This information is extremely valuable," said Garrett Reynolds '24,



a history major who is digitizing the book as part of his internship with the library. "It's a part of Lynchburg history that isn't often talked about."

In the book, Woodroof consistently used the first and last names of the enslaved and who they were sold to. It's a unique find; most records from the time period include very little information.

"Many of the enslavers were from the Mississippi region, so it helps to track the movement of enslaved persons from the East Coast down into the deeper south," said Lisa Lee Broughman '94, director of Randolph's Lipscomb Library. "It's also something, when digitized, that can be shared on websites that help Black Americans trace their genealogy."

As part of his internship, Reynolds transcribed the ledger book, an arduous task that involved deciphering Woodroof's handwriting and writing style. He also scanned in images of the pages, which had to be handled with extreme care.

"The book is so old, with the earliest entries dating back to October 1833," said Reynolds, who is now comparing the names listed in the ledger to the 1870 census, to see how many of the enslaved people were still alive at that point. "It's made out of leather, and it's small. The spine is disintegrating. I had to handle it very carefully."

His work provided the foundation for a project, called "Lynchburg: Named," that has brought together Randolph College and the Jones Memorial Library to explore the region's legacy of slavery and fill in information gaps related to African Americans in Lynchburg.

"Issues of slavery and the enslaved haven't really been dealt with in Lynchburg," said Randolph history professor Gerry Sherayko. "This was much more of a slave trading city than has been acknowledged. We are not an exception. We are part of it, and our story needs to be told."

This summer, Sherayko, Broughman, and Deborah Smith, executive director of the Jones Memorial Library, were one of seven teams chosen to attend the Legacies of American Slavery Public History Institute at Yale University and share information about

#### "Lynchburg: Named."

The institute is part of The Council of Independent Colleges' Legacies of American Slavery project, a collaboration with the Gilder Lehrman Center for the Study of Slavery, Resistance, and Abolition at Yale's MacMillan Center.

It included seminars, site visits, and workshops focusing on public memory and interpretation of slavery.

Teams also presented about individual projects and received feedback from each other.

"It was phenomenal to be around people from other small, liberal arts colleges who are doing, at the ground level, really good work," Sherayko said. "Especially in a time when there are people who don't want to talk about this very thing."

The trio even made a connection with the new director of the Black

History Museum and Cultural Center of Virginia. They're planning a fall visit to the Richmond museum to discuss future collaborations.

Sherayko and Broughman hope the "Lynchburg: Named" project will be a starting point for developing research projects that address Lynchburg's antebellum history, and, eventually, coverage of Black-lived experiences during the Jim Crow era and the Civil Rights movement.

They said the experience at the institute was invaluable to their work with the College's museum and heritage studies major.

"This is important work that contributes to the community of Lynchburg," Sherayko said, "but also feeds into the kind of work we want to do to attract students to that major.

"Our team got a lot out of it," he added, "and I think contributed a lot to it."

Parwin Ahmadi '27 can still vividly recall her last days in Afghanistan.

In the days after the Taliban invaded Kabul in the summer of 2021, Parwin and her family-her older sister, Somaya, along with their parents, younger brother, and grandmother-were among the thousands of people waiting at the airport to leave the country.

"On that first night at the airport, I gazed up at the sky, filled with countless bright stars," she said. "It was a breathtaking sight, but the coldness in the air only added to the heaviness in our hearts as we left our home behind."

The family made the perilous journey to the airport with help from a network of the College's alumnae from across the world–a group that banded together and worked their connections to ensure that the family found not just safety but that the children could eventually continue their education.

It took several days before they were cleared to leave Afghanistan on a military plane. They had no idea where it was headed.

"It felt really strange leaving our country like that," she said. "We were on a military plane, not a regular one you'd expect when leaving a country. Normally, you know your destination when you board a flight, but we didn't. It was a truly sad and unusual experience, and I can't emphasize enough how sad it felt.

"I had always dreamt of leaving my country," Parwin added, "but my vision was to find scholarships for education, and then return to contribute to my homeland. I never imagined that I'd be leaving in such a sorrowful manner."

#### A FAMILY LEGACY

Parwin started classes at Randolph this fall as the first recipient of the Kobra Ahmadi Nader '10 Scholarship for Displaced Students. The scholarship is named in honor of her aunt, who attended Randolph as an international student with assistance from alumnae and The Initiative to Educate Afghan Women.

Kobra, a graduate of the Class of 2010, tragically died in a car accident in 2012, but left behind a legacy.

"Kobra was kind, thoughtful, very smart, and she truly loved her country," said Susan Sardina '70, who became close with Kobra after she came to the United States. "Everything she achieved, she achieved on her own, and it was remarkable. It shows how hard work and commitment can really pay off. And now that's continuing with her nieces, which is really very exciting."

Parwin and Somaya had always hoped to follow in Kobra's footsteps at Randolph.

"In our family, education is highly important," Parwin said. "Our parents always wanted us to study and become independent, just like Kobra. She was the first girl in our family to get an education, and even though she's not with us anymore, her legacy remains strong, especially in our commitment to education."

#### **A PERILOUS JOURNEY**

When Kabul fell to the Taliban, Parwin and Somaya were studying at the University of Kabul. That, in and of itself, made them targets, as well as their father's work with the Afghanistan Independent Human Rights Commission.

"We were so afraid because he had all the documents and his uniform," Parwin said. "We had my aunt's pictures from when she was studying here. We were hidden, all of us, in the house. We couldn't leave our house at all."

"We were filled with deep, paralyzing fear of the Taliban and the uncertainty it brought," Parwin added. "As a young girl, I simply wanted to learn, read, and dream beyond my home. But the Taliban's strict rules for girls made these dreams seem impossible. It was a battle to keep hope alive, but I held onto the belief that one day, somewhere, my dreams of education and a life without fear would come true."

Sardina, too, was afraid, and immediately reached out to Somaya to check on the family. She knew something had to be done to get them out of the country.

She tried going through political channels with no luck, then sent an email to Susan Fant '84, who reached out to the College. It snowballed from there as more alumnae found out about the family's plight and jumped into action.

"It was just a miracle that everyone was getting connected to each other," Parwin said in October, not long after she returned to campus from fall break.

In Farmville, Juanita Giles '96 heard what was happening and started making phone calls of her own, learning about the complex processes involved in securing visas and sponsors for refugees.

All of their work–connecting with people on the ground in Afghanistan, as well as completing mountains of paperwork stateside–culminated in the family being spirited out of Afghanistan a few days after the Taliban's invasion.

"We talked a lot about Kobra's hand



being on everything, miracle after miracle," Giles said. "Every tiny thing had to go perfectly, and every person had to show up at the right time."

The family finally boarded a flight several days later, eventually landing in Abu Dhabi. They lived in a humanitarian camp there for nearly a year-the first several months spent in quarantine with no time outdoors.

For Parwin, "those days were just like years," she said.

She found herself looking at the night sky once again, this time from a tiny window in the room she shared with Somaya.

"It was the only view I had for 11 months," she said.

Stacy DeLano '71, who worked at the College when Kobra was a student and became close with her, connected with the Ahmadis while they were in Abu Dhabi. Like Giles and Sardina, she now considers them part of her own family.

"This whole thing is just a complicated web, and it all starts with Kobra," DeLano said from her home in Portugal. "I feel like she is looking down on her family, and she's taking care of them."

During their time in Abu Dhabi, the family found encouragement from DeLano, Giles, Sardina, and the rest of the alumnae who helped them.

"They encouraged us to hold on to hope," Parwin reflected. "People were reaching out to celebrate our birthdays. It was truly remarkable to discover that there were individuals who genuinely cared for us, even though we were complete strangers. In the midst of the challenging and nightmarish times, it felt like a ray of hope. Many compassionate souls extended their support, making our days in Abu Dhabi more bearable."

#### **A MIRACLE**

As the family waited and went

through various background and medical checks, the work among College alumnae continued.

Giles connected with nonprofit leaders in Farmville and put together a team to help the family with housing, food, jobs, and more.

By the time the family landed in the United States, a fully furnished home was ready for them in Farmville.

"Juanita was sending pictures to us of everything in the house," Parwin remembered. "It was amazing to have everyone waiting for us to come. It felt really good. We didn't know anyone in this country, but we had people waiting for us."

They met Giles, who Parwin and Somaya now call their godmother, in person for the first time on the day they arrived, and Sardina last fall when she drove down from Boston. They're still waiting to meet DeLano, but Parwin hopes to visit her in Portugal eventually.

Meanwhile, work to establish a scholarship in Kobra's name was ongoing behind the Red Brick Wall, with President Sue Ott Rowlands making the first leadership gift to the fund.

"I'm so incredibly proud to have been involved in any of it along the way," Sardina said. "Anyone who knew Kobra absolutely loved her. To think that, now, her name can live on is incredible."

Parwin, who is majoring in business with a minor in computer science, finished her first session with A's in both classes. She's excited about the possibilities of internships and plans to participate in Model United Nations next spring.

"I wasn't sure if I would be coming to Randolph at all," she said. "We were really hopeful to go to school again, to be educated, to be free. It's a miracle to be studying again."

Largest first-year class in six years arrives on campus Ø

P resident Sue Ott Rowlands offered a special welcome to the "mighty" Class of 2027 during Randolph's Convocation ceremony.

"I speak for all of us when I say how happy we are to have you join our community," she said, "and I hope you know how much we are looking forward to getting to know you."

Randolph welcomed its largest class in nearly six years this fall, a talented, diverse group that only adds to the momentum the College has experienced over the last year.

"When I think about all that we've accomplished as a College, it is clear to me that we did these things because we worked together and because we believed we could do them," she said during Convocation. "New academic programs. New athletic programs. Our largest first-year class in six years. New opportunities to connect with our local Lynchburg community. Renewed efforts to be a student-ready campus.

"By working together," she added, "we are already defining ourselves in new ways and moving forward to meet the challenges of this era."

The class includes 200 new students, which is a 36 percent increase over last year, and a total of 228 new students, including transfers, which is a 30 percent increase.

"We are extremely proud of the growth that we are seeing," said Travis Carter, dean of admission and financial aid.

The growth can be attributed to a number of factors. Randolph has seen a tremendous response from prospective students and families to its new TAKE2 curriculum model, which was launched two years ago.


Under this model, students take two classes each seven weeks, with no classes on Wednesday.

"We know TAKE2 has made a difference in our enrollment, not to mention the success our students are having in the classroom," Carter said. "We have seen increases in test scores, the number of students on the Dean's List, attendance and more. Families see the difference TAKE2 is making in the lives of our students on campus, especially when you combine that with our small, beautiful campus, growing academic and athletic programs, affordable tuition, and caring faculty and staff."

The TAKE2 model also allowed the College to offer a new program this fall that provided students with an easier-and faster-way to transfer or enter college.



Under the new plan, students could enroll to start classes at the beginning of Session 2 in October. Most colleges make students wait until the next semester to transfer or enroll.

"We want to make Randolph as accessible and affordable as possible in order to open this enriching experience to more students," Ott Rowlands said. "Not only does TAKE2 make us distinctive in the higher ed environment, it allows us added flexibility in situations like this."

The College has also expanded its academic offerings, adding six new majors, two new master's programs, and an honors program. The athletic program is growing as well, with four additional sports (women's STUNT, men's volleyball, and women's and men's wrestling) scheduled to begin in 2024-25.


# RESIDENCE TO MEET THE OPPORTUN

# Randolph senior makes lasting memories during internship with NASA

Jadin Wilkening '24 spent her summer traveling between NASA headquarters in Washington, D.C., and the Goddard Space Flight Center in Greenbelt, Maryland, for her internship with the space agency's Disasters Program.

The program uses Earth-observing data and applied research to improve the prediction of, preparation for, response to, and recovery from hazards and disasters around the world.

Wilkening, a computer science and mathematics major, used a Randolph Innovative Student Experience (RISE) grant to cover her living expenses during the 10week internship.

"The financial support allowed me to fully focus on my internship without worrying about the cost of living," she said. "It also allowed me to embrace the opportunity fully, growing both personally and professionally, and making lasting memories during this pivotal time in my life. It played a crucial role in shaping my internship journey at NASA."

Wilkening gained hands-on

experience and expertise with frontend and back-end technologies, data visualization, and user experience design while working as part of a small team of interns developing and maintaining an internal website that connects scientists, engineers, and researchers with resources, data, and other essential information.

She also flexed her problem-solving skills and gained confidence contributing to projects.

"The internship has been a transformative experience that bridges the gap between academic learning and real-world application," said Wilkening, who wants to pursue a career in software engineering or web development. "I'm eager to build on this foundation. These skills are directly transferable to my academic projects and future career pursuits, giving me a competitive edge in the job market.

William Olichney '24 takes advantage of opportunity to study in Taiwan

emories from his summer in Taiwan come quickly to William Olichney '24.

DUCATION

Like the time he and a group of friends got lost on the way to the beach. Or, later that same day, when they stumbled upon a Sunday afternoon karaoke session.

He fondly remembered a trip with his host family to Taoyuan to make pottery and a visit with their youngest son to one of Taiwan's night markets, open-air street fairs full of specialty food stalls, vendors, and entertainment.

"The stalls seem to go on forever," said Olichney, who spent eight weeks in Taiwan as part of an immersive language program in Mandarin. "They sell every kind of snack imaginable, from squid or snake soup to boba tea. We would walk around, eat, and walk around until we got hungry again.

"I could mention all sorts of stories, which might not even sound exciting," he added. "But the added level of needing to use Mandarin to navigate through made them unforgettable and fantastic."

Olichney studied Mandarin through the American Councils for International Education's Taiwan Intensive Summer Language Program (TISLP). He took four hours of classes a day at National Tsing Hua University in Hsinchu, Taiwan, a mix of lectures, drilling practices, discussions, and one-on-one conversations. On weekends, students took cultural excursions to museums and historic sites. He also stayed with the aforementioned host family for a weekend.

Throughout it all, Olichney could never fall back on the crutch of speaking his native language.

"I love trying to circumlocute," he said. "How do you explain your meaning if you don't know a particular word? Paragraphs of other words. Bumbling around a more convenient word will also force you to practice speaking."

He had previously studied Mandarin with Randolph professor Kun An, but knew he needed something more intense to become fluent.

"I needed an environment where I would be forced to practice my Mandarin alongside other competitive students," he said. "Not only was the program necessary for improving my language skills, but it also improved my resiliency and cultural awareness."

Olichney, a history and economics double major with a minor in Asian studies,

was awarded a prestigious Fulbright-Hays Group Projects Abroad (GPA) grant through the United States Department of Education.

The GPA program is designed to contribute to the development and improvement of the study of modern foreign languages through a variety of projects, including immersive language programs.

The \$7,915 grant paid for most of his tuition to TISLP, and a RISE grant covered his travel expenses.

Olichney called it one of the best experiences of his life.

"While the coursework was the most intense I've ever experienced, it was also the most gratifying," he said. "I loved these classes so much. I always wanted to practice new grammar or vocabulary. Every week, my Mandarin improved immensely."

He'd eventually like to attend graduate school for East Asian studies, but is also interested in policy analysis and design, international business, and trade.

"I study history and economics. In both of these disciplines, Mandarin-speaking countries are interesting and significant players," he said. "Any educational route that leads me to use Mandarin and improve my research skills has been in my sights since my first year at Randolph."

K athryn Davis '24 lived an adventurer's dream over the summer in Australia.

She swam alongside a hawksbill sea turtle, a critically endangered species, while snorkeling the Great Barrier Reef–and spotted humpback whales on the boat ride over.

She watched wallabies during an overnight camping trip to Australia's Granite Gorge Nature Park and visited two wildlife sanctuaries.

And those were just the excursions she took with her fellow students in the School for Field

Studies (SFS), one of the United States' largest environmental study abroad programs.

The actual work Davis did was based at the SFS Center for Rainforest Studies in the Wet Tropics of Queensland World Heritage Area, which stretches along the northeast coast of Australia.

Made up largely of tropical rainforests, it's home to a wide array of plants, marsupials, and singing birds, as well as other rare and endangered animals and plants.

"Since my program focused on marsupials, almost all of which are nocturnal, we did a large amount of spotlighting for both terrestrial and arboreal activity between dusk and dawn," said Davis, an environmental studies major. "We split into groups and walked around in various forested locations with headlamps and flashlights to see what activity we could spot."

Living and working in the environment they were studying was invaluable.

"It gave me firsthand experience with conservation field work in one of the most diverse ecosystems in the world," Davis said. "As students, being with our program leaders and professors a majority of the time gave us so many opportunities to never stop asking questions and get more information to push our education further."

Her time in Australia was supported by a RISE grant and a global studies scholarship, which provides assistance to students who want to study abroad.

"Having something like the RISE grant and the scholarship directly available to students only encourages us to pursue alternative learning opportunities," Davis said. "There is a lot of support from faculty and staff to apply."

Davis and the students in the SFS program completed final projects sharing data from their nights spotlighting; her presentation focused on how mammals there are reacting to changing conditions in the rainforest.

"Deforestation of rainforest areas is a huge issue in North Queensland, but there are many volunteer organizations focusing on rebuilding the fragments of open area between old-growth forests that were previously lost to logging and agricultural development," she explained. "Our report focused on the question of how mammals in general were reacting to the new-growth forests being rebuilt in the fragments between the old-growth forests."

Davis has always been interested in conservation, and after exploring different ways to pursue it, decided wildlife conservation is the right path.

"It's where I feel I can have the most impact," she said. "My SFS experience helped prove that to me as well. I've been around animals my entire life, and protecting and caring for nature is something I have always been passionate about, both in and out of the classroom."

# WILDCATREETS WILDCATREETS WILDCATREETS

n one of the photos from his summer internship, Izaiah Burgos '24 kneels, his hand pressed against a chain link fence that separates him from some quite literal beasts of the wild-cheetahs, leopards, and pumas among them.

In another photo, creatures lay down, looking up at him inquisitively, while others feature animals standing on their hind legs, mouths pressed against his hand.

Some internships require students to learn software, file papers, or make phone

calls.

Hand-feeding these majestic creatures was just one of the responsibilities Burgos was charged with during his five-week internship with ZA Cheetah Conservation Cheetah Experience in South Africa.

The facility is home to a variety of endangered and threatened species, including cheetahs, leopards, wolves, male non-breeding lions, African wildcats, meerkats, and even a Siberian tiger.

Its mission is to raise awareness of

the vulnerability of South African species through educational experiences, while also ethically breeding cheetahs in captivity and releasing them into protected reserves.

"It was surreal," said Burgos, who also prepared their food, cleaned enclosures, monitored camera traps, and did perimeter checks. "To be around them and care for them was rewarding and never felt like a chore, no matter how hard the work was. You fall in love with them so quickly. You learn their behaviors and come to know the

Cheetahs have always been his favorite animal, but he was also charmed by the leopards at the facility.

"They're beautiful and always seem to be thinking through everything," he said. "One of the leopards I'd train wouldn't break eye contact with me while I was feeding her and leading her through the behaviors. It was humbling, to be in front of a predator and know I had its willful cooperation-a bond of sorts."

For Burgos, a biology major, the experience was the culmination of a lifelong passion for animals he has pursued since coming to Randolph.

In 2021, he interned with Sarasota Jungle Gardens, a zoo in Florida that's home to more than 200 native and exotic species, including birds of prey, primates, small mammals, alligators, crocodiles, and pink flamingos.

He stayed closer to home during the summer of 2022, completing an international externship with the National Geographic Society and The Nature Conservancy focused on marine conservation, while still making plans to head to South Africa before his senior

"Exploring the natural world, and the animals in it, was always a dream of mine," said Burgos, who used a RISE grant to pay the fees associated with ZA Conservation's internship program.

"Having the RISE grant means opportunities and learning," he added. "Without RISE, I wouldn't have been able to travel to Africa this year. I wouldn't have been able to undertake a training project or learn how to care for such spectacular animals. I'm glad RISE is something I was able to use, but also that other students can also utilize this for any opportunities they want to pursue."

Burgos is still deciding what his next steps will be after graduation. He eventually wants to pursue graduate school, but might work a few seasons as a wildlife technician or try to go abroad again.

His ultimate goal, though, is to continue what he started this summer in South Africa.

"There are amazing animals all over the world, but there's something special about big cats," he said. "I love working and being around them. I hope to work in both their care and their conservation someday."



# Chemistry professor earns photography honor

t was a fall morning, and Bill Bare had just trekked into the mountains to take photos of fog rolling through the Blue Ridge at sunrise.

As he was driving down U.S. 501 past Georgia-Pacific's paper mill in Big Island, inspiration struck. The mill's smokestacks were surrounded by fog in the early morning light, and Bare stopped to capture it on film.

"It was really fortuitous," said Bare, a chemistry professor at Randolph. "It was a cold morning, so most of it was just river fog. But it added a nice atmosphere to it."

The resulting image, *Smokestacks*, was recently accepted into the Academy Center of the Arts' National Juried Photography Exhibition, which was held in September in downtown Lynchburg. Bare's work has previously been accepted into other shows around the state, but for him, this one is particularly special.

"To have a photo in a juried show in my own town is a big thrill," he said.

Bare first became interested in photography about seven years ago, after taking the scenic route home from a conference in upstate New York.

"I drove through all these little towns with old, wooden churches and town squares," he remembered. "I started taking pictures, and it was so relaxing."

At the time, he was armed only with his cellphone. But Bare upgraded in 2020 and bought his first camera.

"I barely knew which end to look into," he joked. "So I started watching videos online. It was amazing how much I could learn by watching YouTube and going out to practice."

He's since joined the Blue Ridge Photographic Arts Society. As far as his interests, he's dabbled in nightscapes– landscape photos taken at night–and lately has been focusing on architecture.

Bare shares his photographs on a website, *Barely Competent Photography*, where he talks about leaving "my books and beakers behind" to hit the road in search of something to photograph.

For him, photography is a meditative experience that allows him to clear his mind.

"It takes all of my concentration, and everything else disappears," Bare said. "It's therapeutic."

It was created in the 1940s by Florentine Craftsmen, a New York manufacturer of handcrafted statuary, in memory of Jane Leggett, the daughter of Ruth Leggett who died at 3 months of age. Originally the statue was in the Leggett family's backyard, but it was removed and gifted to the College in 1992. Ruth was the wife of Harold G. Leggett Sr., a College trustee for whom the Leggett Building was named.
