

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Cover: Randolph students participated in a whale-watching trip this semester. (Illustrated photo)

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

FROM THE PRESIDENT



At the end of February and the beginning of March, I spent two weeks with a group of alumnae visiting Vietnam. The travel group was amazing, and we had the opportunity to see the beautiful lands of Vietnam, as well as meet several significant figures in history, including Kim Phuc Phan Thi and Nick Ut.

Nick took the Pulitzer Prize-winning photo of Kim Phuc (who refers to herself as the napalm girl) as a child

when she ran screaming following a napalm strike in Trång Bàng during the Vietnam War. It was 1972, and his photo captured the emotion, pain, violence, and trauma of war. The photo is titled, "The Terror of War," but it is also known as "Napalm Girl" with its depiction of the badly burned, naked, 9-year-old Phuc.

There are moments in your life when you realize you are witnessing history, and this was one of those for me. I am so glad I was able to experience it beside several of our alumnae. Another example was earlier this year when we featured Angela Davis as our Martin Luther King, Jr. Celebration speaker. Davis had an insightful conversation in front of a packed Smith Hall Theatre about her life experiences as a political activist, scholar, educator, and author.

And then in April, we welcomed Jetsun Pema to campus to receive our Pearl S. Buck Award. Pema, the younger sister of His Holiness the 14th Dalai Lama, has dedicated her life to educating Tibetan children in exile.

We can learn so much from people with backgrounds different from our own, and these types of experiences are some of the most important for our students here at Randolph. We work hard to bring a variety of speakers and others to campus to offer their expertise, insight, and viewpoints to broaden the perspectives of our community. The speakers may not always be internationally acclaimed, but each adds to the educational foundation we are providing to our students.

I hope that you will come back to campus to join us for future events and also to offer your own life experiences to our students. We value your involvement and look forward to welcoming you home to Randolph.

Randolph welcomes new chief diversity officer

Charles E. Angela Davis headlines MLK celebration

Author and activist Angela Davis, who has been deeply involved in Movements for social justice around the world, spoke in January during Randolph's annual celebration honoring Martin Luther King Jr. Davis' work as an educator–both at the university level and in the larger public sphere–has always emphasized the importance of building communities for economic, racial, and gender justice. She is the author of 11 books, including *Abolition.Feminism.Now* and a new edition of her *Autobiography*, which was released in 2022.



College holds 2nd Student Success Summit

Anthony Abraham Jack, author of *The Privileged Poor: How Elite Colleges Are Failing Disadvantaged Students*, spoke to faculty and staff during the 2nd Student Success Summit this winter. Jack discussed the importance of reaching out to first-generation and lower-income students and recognizing the rich diversity of their experiences. "Lower-income students have shared beginnings but live ever more divergent lives before coming to college," he said. "We must examine where students come from and what they have been through to understand why they chart the paths they do once they reach our gates."



Maier celebrates 30-year partnership with LCS

The Maier Museum of Art at Randolph College celebrated its 30th anniversary as one of Lynchburg City Schools' Partners in Education this year. The partnership, a joint venture between LCS and the Lynchburg Regional Business Alliance, creates links between the school system and area businesses, organizations, and institutions. As part of its Art & SOL program, the Maier has offered free guided tours for all LCS fifth graders—and other area schools upon request—since 1993. The tours are designed to be an extension of the classroom, centered on the Virginia Department of Education Standards of Learning (SOLs) objectives for visual arts, language, and social studies.



Randolph named a College of Distinction

Randolph College was named a College of Distinction for the 2023-2024 academic year, an honor that recognizes the College's high-quality education, hands-on learning, strong student-faculty relationships, and campus life. Colleges of Distinction's selection process involves in-depth research and a sequence of detailed interviews with the schools, accepting only those that adhere to the Four Distinctions: Engaged Students, Great Teaching, Vibrant Community, and Successful Outcomes.



Maier hosts Virginia Docent Exchange

In March, the Maier Museum of Art at Randolph College hosted the 15th Virginia Docent Exchange, a professional development conference for docents from art museums across the state. Sixty docents from 10 museums attended the event, which was focused on curating community both within and beyond museum doors.



Master of Arts in Coaching and Sport Leadership

MACSL earns accreditation

Randolph's Master of Arts in Coaching and Sport Leadership program has earned accreditation from the National Committee for Accreditation of Coaching Education (NCACE) after a nearly yearlong process. NCACE offers accreditation and national recognition to sport organizations and institutions responsible for the preparation of coaches at any and all levels of sport. The College's MACSL program is the only accredited coaching education graduate program in Virginia and one of less than 12 programs in the entire country.



Society of Physics Students recognized

Randolph's chapter of the Society of Physics Students (SPS) recently won an Outstanding Chapter Award from the SPS national office. Presented by the national SPS organization, the designation honors the group for its activities during the 2022-23 academic year. The designation is given to fewer than 15 percent of chapters at colleges and universities in the U.S. and internationally, with just 73 of more than 800 chapters honored this year. Randolph students have won the Outstanding Chapter award more than a dozen times in as many years, most recently in 2022.



Thayer Lecture focuses on Virginia Eugenics at 100

Historian and writer Elizabeth Catte gave Randolph College's 2024 Philip Thayer Memorial Lecture, "Virginia Eugenics at 100 Years." Catte, author of What You Are Getting Wrong About Appalachia (2018) and Pure America: Eugenics and the Making of Modern Virginia (2021), writes compact nonfiction about history, memory, and place. She also runs Passel, an applied history firm that does consulting work to solve real-world problems in Appalachia and the mid-Atlantic.


Aaron Shreve

About 80 percent of children who stutter at some time during their development become fluent speakers.

Carl Coffey '11 is focused on the 20 percent who, like him, grow up to be adults who stutter.

"I didn't really know anyone who stuttered that I could look up to as a role model when I was a kid, so now I want to be as open about it as I can," he said. "As I've become older, I'm a lot more comfortable. It's just a part of who I am."

Coffey, who majored in psychology at Randolph, has used social media, particularly LinkedIn, to connect with other people who stutter.

He shares links to raise awareness and start conversations; one recent post linked to a story about retired football player and media personality Shannon Sharpe discussing his own speech impediment.

"It's been really cool for me as I've posted these things and been more open about it. I have connected with a lot of other people who have never really talked about their stutter," Coffey said. "There are so many platforms that are allowing people to have that conversation, to really find their own voice and talk about it."

In 2023, Coffey partnered with the National Stuttering Association to produce a video series discussing his career journey. Called *Full Disclosure*, it featured topics ranging from how to disclose your stutter, requesting accommodations, and handling discrimination in the workplace to networking, negotiating, and accepting a job offer.

"It is one of those disabilities where there's not a lot of public understanding," he said. "People still think, if you stutter, it's just because you're nervous or unsure of what you want to say. It's about being able to raise awareness to say, 'Hey, it is a neurological condition. While there are some days you may not notice it as much, I still am a person who stutters.'"

Coffey spent most of his younger years as what's referred to as a covert stutterer–someone who tries to mask their condition.

"I was uncomfortable talking about it and acknowledging it," he said. "I was a really outgoing kid, and I tried my best to make people laugh. I wanted to take the attention off of me and my stutter."

His parents were always supportive, encouraging him to push through any challenges.

"My dad told me something that I take to heart," Coffey remembered. "He said, 'Hey, everyone's got their thing, something they either are not comfortable with acknowledging or that they're self conscious about. With you, it's the fact that you stutter. That's just your thing. You have to find a way to be OK with it and know you can still live a good life."

It would take Coffey years to get to that point.

He continued to hide his stutter as a student at Randolph, where he was part of the College's first coed class.

An active student, he served as Student Government president and publicity coordinator for the Black Leaders Association, while also competing on the tennis and crosscountry teams.

"A lot of people would say they had no idea I stuttered," he said. "My response to that was, 'I know, because I purposely tried to hide it.' So even when I was in college, I didn't know how to talk about it."

Coffey took speech therapy from

kindergarten through his senior year of high school, then returned to it as an adult, a turning point for him.

"I was in a job where I had to present in a lot of meetings," said Coffey, who has worked in financial services, healthcare operations, and consulting since graduating from the College. "I wanted to feel more confident in portraying my thoughts and not feeling like I was being held back. I tried to find comfort in knowing this is something that is clearly not going away, but it didn't have to be a deal breaker. It's just the way I talk."

Currently living in Bowling Green, Kentucky, he remains connected to the College. He recently returned to campus to speak to students as part of National Disability Awareness Month, talking about equal employment opportunities and promoting diversity and inclusion in the workplace.

Coffey also joined the Board of Trustees in 2022 as its youngest elected member.

"It is a really incredible experience to have this full circle moment," he said. "I was very involved as a student, so I had a good opportunity to interact with the Board of Trustees as president of Student Government. It's been awesome to come back to help the College and support students in this capacity."

For Coffey, it's about giving back to a place that gave him so much.

"Randolph is a place where you don't just blend into the background," Coffey said. "You're deeply embedded into a community where you matter, your contributions are valued, you shape the culture, you're held accountable, and you leave your imprint. It's a place where I found the power of my voice, and I'm forever grateful for that."

New program expands Randolph's mental health offerings for students

Randolph College's Counseling Center has long been a place of refuge for students, where they can seek out mental health support from a qualified staff of professionals.

Not willing to leave anyone behind, the center added telehealth during the pandemic and continues to adapt to students' needs.

This spring, the College added another option for students, expanding mental health services through a partnership with TimelyCare, a virtual health and well-being provider.

The service is designed as an extension of campus health and counseling center resources, allowing Randolph to deliver a hybrid model of

care to students.

"We've been interested in telehealth for a while, and TimelyCare is the largest provider right now to colleges and universities in the state of Virginia," said Chris Lemasters, dean of students. "They serve over 300,000 students in the region. I was able to talk to peers at those institutions to see what their experience was with the company, and we were impressed with the offerings."

Accessible by phone or other device, TimelyCare includes a wide-ranging menu of virtual care options from licensed physicians and counselors in all 50 states. Services include mental health and emotional support, appointment-based mental health counseling, health

coaching, digital self-care content, and a peer support community.

"This is an add-on to what our Counseling Center offers," Lemasters said. "We love the idea that this is going to fit in really well with students' schedules. It's mobile-friendly and provides a really on-the-go opportunity to our students 24/7, 365 days a year. Students will even have access to TimelyCare during college breaks when our health and counseling center is not open."

That flexibility extends beyond the timing, added Jennifer Bondurant, director of the Counseling Center.

"Students are able to access the bios of available counselors to choose what might be the best fit for them, and they

can also receive services in their preferred language," she said. "This could really strengthen the therapeutic relationship. TimelyCare will also offer informational videos to provide support to students that may not need weekly counseling, but still want to improve overall wellness."


Randolph is providing the service to students using funds from The Endeavor Foundation. The College was one of 13 to receive the funding for the first phase of Endeavor's "Enhancing Student Learning and Experience through Campus Wellness, Student Wellbeing, and Mental Health Initiatives."

The need for 24/7 access to high-quality care has never been more important. According to the American Council on Education, student mental health is the top concern of college and university presidents. It's also the number one reason students leave college.

Three-quarters of students who accessed virtual

support through TimelyCare said they would have done nothing if the service had not been available.

"When it comes to supporting student outcomes, the need for equitable, on-demand access to care has never been more important," said Luke Hejl, Timely Care CEO and co-founder. "TimelyCare enables colleges and universities to expand on-campus resources and transform the way students receive care through agency, speed, and freedom of choice that they've come to expect in their everyday lives. TimelyCare is proud to serve as an extension of Randolph's resources to create a comprehensive, whole-student care solution that empowers students to seek care in a way that feels comfortable and convenient for them."





Unique musical challenges Randolph cast

Randolph's spring stage production, Edges The Musical, is about a group of young adults teetering on the metaphorical edge of their lives—something certainly relatable to its cast of college students.

Songs reflect on universal issues like love, commitment, identity, and meaning, and characters ask classic coming-of-age questions about who they are and who they want to become.

Two sisters sing about growing apart as one of them grows up. A woman contemplates love in one song, while a man reels from a breakup in another.

"People use entertainment to escape the reality of the world, or to dissect what is real," said Isaac Carney '24, who performed in the ensemble. "This performance exemplified the latter. It was real. I could relate to the feeling of expectations and the requirement by the world to be something or someone I was never designed to be."

Edges was written by the Tony and Academy Award-winning composing team of Benj Pasek and Justin Paul (*Dear Evan Hanson, La La Land*) during their sophomore year at the University of Michigan.

It's written as a song cycle, a series of

songs that are designed to be performed in sequence, as a unit. That means most of the elements of a traditional theater production—dialogue and scene transitions, for instance—are not present.

"The songs tell individual stories in each piece, and they all fit together thematically," said director Stephanie Earl. "It really gave us the chance to build the show together. It was fun to dissect each character in each song with the students and figure out what it meant to the show as a whole."

Edges was first produced in 2005, featuring 13 songs. Several of those songs were swapped out for new ones during a 2007 revival, and groups that stage the show can choose from both versions.

"Pasek and Paul have this great letter they present to anyone doing their show, saying that it is up to the production which songs you want to include and what order you want to put them in, which is very unusual," Earl said. "Generally when you work on a show, you cannot change anything, and you can't move things around. We loved the flexibility of the show and that the composing team built that into being a fun part of the project."

It was fun, but not without its difficulties.

"It's more challenging to figure out how to go from one song to the next," Earl said. "It would be very easy for it to turn into a concert. We really tried to keep the action continuous. We wanted it to feel like a piece of theatre, even though there was no spoken text."

Those conversations among the cast members were an invaluable part of the process for Savannah Davis '27.

"There was a bit of trial and error, playing around with different orders, but the more conversations we had, we eventually found a song order that stuck," Davis said. "The whole process inspired so much creativity."

Randolph's staging included a cast of 10 students singing 13 songs that Earl said had a pop-rock, early 2000s feel to them.

"It was a really strong, special cast that I had a lot of trust and faith in," she said. "There was a maturity to all of the performances. The songs are not easy to sing, and they really worked hard to dig in and make them their own. They showed off their vocal chops in ways people hadn't seen before."







New marine science major opens world of opportunities for students

Getting out of the classroom and into the world is a hallmark of the Randolph experience—something students saw first-hand over the last year in the College's new marine science program.

In the fall, they visited the Eastern Shore. And in February, they took a trip to Virginia Beach that included a whale-watching excursion.

"I was talking to a colleague who told me that she still has a picture of herself from one of her first field experiences in college," said Sarah Sojka, a professor of environmental studies and physics, who is leading the marine science program. "Every time she looks at the picture, she remembers how proud she was to be collecting real data that day. I want to give our students that same feeling."

During their fall Eastern Shore trip, students assisted scientists at the University of Virginia's Coastal Research Center with water quality monitoring. It was a chance for them to experience both field and lab work alongside working scientists.

"There are so many great educational opportunities in our area, and we want to give students opportunities to explore them," Sojka said. "I always tell students they don't have to be a field scientist to be a marine scientist, but I want them to know before graduation where they fit into that world."

In February, Sojka and professor Karin Warren took students to the Virginia Aquarium and Marine Science Center in Virginia Beach. They toured the aquarium, seeing aquatic life including sharks, sea turtles, and rays, and went out on the ocean in search of whales.

The College began offering the major this fall, and it's one of the only programs of its kind in Virginia.

For Preas, pursuing her passion for the ocean in Virginia, not far from where she grew up, was a unique opportunity she couldn't pass up.

"Marine science has been something I've been interested in since I was little, but I was always like, 'I'm in Central Virginia. That's kind of not possible,'" said Preas, who grew up in Altavista and transferred to Randolph this fall. "So I settled for other degrees. But

then Randolph put this out there."

CJ Bundy '26 has a similar story.

"Reading the curriculum for this new major is the reason why I'm here," she said. "The professors have already started to prepare me for the future with actual fieldwork and research I can put on my resume."

The major is an interdisciplinary marine science program, a study of the world's oceans and marine life that includes marine biology, marine and coastal ecosystems, oceanography, ocean-atmosphere dynamics, and climate change.

The curriculum challenges students to look at all of the physics and chemistry that shape life in the ocean. Students have plenty of opportunities for hands-on experience with summer and semester fieldwork, as well

as off-campus and study-away options and class-based activities such as analyzing water and sand samples.

"One of the things we work really hard on with our students is helping them understand where in this big realm of opportunity they want to fit when they graduate," Sojka said. "We designed our program so that if life takes them inland later on, students have a really strong scientific background they could take to other aquatic systems or even other terrestrial systems because they understand a lot about ecology and geology, chemistry, and atmospheric science. They will have a great education that sets them up for a variety of careers."

The curriculum also includes special topics courses that will vary from year to year. Sojka taught a marine heat waves course

during Session 3. Other offerings will be tailored to student interest or current events, but related to themes in marine science, marine ecology, coastal systems, and/or oceanography.

"One of the fun things about actually not being immediately on the ocean is we've been a little bit creative about how we engage students with the ocean," Sojka said. "We obviously take trips out to do marine science work, but we've also brought some virtual reality into our classrooms. And while that sounds possibly a little odd, if you think about it, a lot of our exploration of the ocean

is through unmanned autonomous robots and vehicles and things like that. Virtual reality can replicate that pretty well."

Marine science is an important field. Oceans are a source of food and oxygen, generating 50 percent of the oxygen we need to breathe. They also absorb carbon dioxide emissions, a vital buffer against climate change while, at the same time, they experience negative impacts because of both climate change and pollution.

"There's so much about our oceans we don't know, and there are so many threats to them," Sojka said. "It's this combination of all these reasons to learn more about the environment."

The next generation of scientists will play a vital role in understanding and sharing that knowledge.

"One of the things we do exceptionally well at Randolph is train scientists who are really good critical thinkers and communicators," Sojka said. "And if we don't have people who can communicate the science, then it doesn't have as much value. We need people who are able to tell the story of what we're learning about our oceans."

"I was at a crossroads in my life, this time with my son, and I knew I needed to do something for me. I needed to finish what I started, my degree in psychology, and show my son a different life. Him seeing me go back to school at my age, while working, and taking care of him by myself, shows that he has no excuses in life. When he was 3 years old, he saw me write down on a piece of paper a goal that I never gave up on, and it came true. He sees me thriving and coming back to life right before his eyes, and it all started with writing that list."

What has your time behind the Red Brick Wall been like so far?

"It has been phenomenal. I feel so honored to come to Randolph each day, to a place where I get to be me, not just a student ID number or first initial and last name. That means a lot to me."

What is it like being a transfer student here?

"When you transfer to a new school, it's like transferring to a new culture and a new family. I'm grateful I was accepted with open arms into this Randolph community and family. Having students, staff, and faculty who help without judging is priceless. Things have changed in the last 20-plus years and, as a student of a certain age, as I like to call myself, I never feel as though I'm going to be talked down to, talked about when I leave, or judged for not knowing something."

What advice would you give to other transfer students?


"I would advise them to get to know their advisors ASAP, as they are going to be your lifelines! Get into an activity! Bring YOURSELF every day, and watch how well you fit in! Apply for scholarships and grants, internships, and summer opportunities. You never know what can come out of these. Attend a few luncheons and get to know the faculty members and visiting professors. Take a walk around campus and just breathe."

What is special about Randolph?

"What is special to me is I'm doing this on my terms, for my reasons, in my timing, and I fit in somewhere finally, after feeling like I fit 'out' for so long. I also get to do this with my son! He has been with me every step of the way. I literally feel like we are getting this degree together. As a mother, when you know your child is safe and in a loving environment, the sky's the limit as to what you can do because you are able to breathe easier, and know that the most important part of you is safe, sane, and secure. I couldn't ask for anything more for myself, or my son. Randolph is a stepping stone for us that we will never forget."

CREATING LAUGHTER

Talent, perseverance, and a little stubbornness propel Lianna Carrera '07 to success in comedy writing career

ianna Carrera '07 has had a lot of cool moments in her career, but one stands above the rest.

"There's no feeling quite like writing a script and watching Kevin Hart say the words for the first time," said Carrera, who works as a comedy writer for the star's media company, HartBeat. "It was a surreal moment where I was like, 'Wow. I'm doing it.'"

Carrera moved to Los Angeles in 2011 to pursue a career in stand-up comedy, something she found a passion for while emceeing an event at Randolph.

It was a big risk, moving across the country. But she was never averse to risk, especially during her time behind the Red Brick Wall.

"Randolph is sort of a wonderful incubator," said Carrera. "Every time I went into the Dean of the College's office, I would make them laugh with my plans and ideas, but nobody ever said no. It's a testament to what a small community can do. I don't know if I would have been

nurtured the same way at a larger university. I left Randolph feeling like I could fly."

During her senior year, Carrera even delayed graduation so she could qualify for one of the few spots available in The Second City Comedy Studies Program at Columbia College Chicago.

"I feel like creative minds are always up to hair-brained schemes. That, the audacity of youth and a college environment where I was made to believe that anything was possible led me to apply," she said. "At the time, they were even asking for prerequisites that I did not have. Things like Acting 4, which the College didn't even offer at the time. None of this stopped me from marching into the Dean of the College's office, telling Dean Wallace that I think I'm supposed to be a comedian."

Carrera was eventually accepted into the program, where she took classes in acting and writing for comedy, vocal training, improv, and movement.

"For the first time in my life, I got straight As," she said. "It wasn't like it was easy, either. It was very challenging. I just learned what I'm capable of when I apply myself."

And it gave her the confidence she needed to pursue comedy full time.

"Looking back, I still had no real idea of what I was in for. I hodgepodged a career performing at colleges and small theaters around the country. And when I finally moved to L.A., the period of hearing 'no' more than I heard 'yes' would begin."

She remembered someone telling her that making it in the industry by year 10 would be considered an overnight success.

"I think what people misunderstand about Hollywood is ... everything," she said. "I know I was certainly caught off guard. Of course, everyone who comes here thinks they're the exception. That's the magic of Hollywood. There's a chance you can be. But for the most part, there's too much money and too many careers on the line for casting directors, producers, and executives to greenlight just anything and anyone.

"Which ultimately means you really have to be in it for the long haul," added Carrera, who is a stepmom to two children, ages 12 and 7, with her wife, Kim. "I'm either really smart or really stubborn. Time will tell."

Everything she does onstage—perfecting her timing, trying out punchlines on different audiences—were a natural fit for a career in comedy writing, which she eventually pursued alongside her stand-up.

"I think it's important when you get into any sort of entertainment career path, you're able to expand on what those opportunities could be and what they could bring you," said Carrera, who also worked for Will Smith's multimedia company, Westbrook. "I was very focused on stand-up for a long time, and it feels like stand-up opened more doors than I knew were coming."

Carrera also hosts *The Q Agenda* on LATV, where she and her cohosts discuss the intersections of Latinx and

LGBTQ issues. They're coming up on their 100th episode and, last year, were recognized on *Out Magazine*'s Out 100, as one of 100 Titans of Media and Entertainment.

In her own personal work, Carrera continues to explore ways to use comedy in everyday spaces and everyday ways.

In 2022, she developed and wrote *A Comedian's Guide to Wedding Speeches*, which premiered at No. 1 on the Best New Releases in Humor and Entertainment Shorts category on Amazon's Kindle Store. She plans to turn it into a series of books focusing on other topics, such as divorce, break-ups, and more.

"Comedy is a point of view on life," she said. "It's a choice every moment to see the humor. Even in tragedy, there's wisdom in trying to see the glass half-full. My goal is to put out a series of books that help people apply the philosophy of comedy to hardships


in their lives and process things like a comedian might."

At HartBeat, she flexes her creative muscles writing, pitching, and executing ideas for campaigns featuring Hart and other leading comedians and entertainers. She's worked across a range of categories, from movies, TV, and gaming to retail, tech, and travel.

She and her team have written digital content funded by brands like Hulu, Hyundai, Sam's Club, Venus, and more. She also received her first television writing credit for Hart's End of the Year special on Peacock.

"As a writer, I get to touch a lot of different projects and different things," said Carrera, the only full-time staff writer and creative on her team. "Kevin has so many different business ventures, so I get to tap into that. I still keep my stand-up ties, but I'm finding it so much more exciting to be part of a team that gets to creatively output content that millions of people see."





Randolph's robotics and mechatronics engineering major, which will begin this fall, provides students with the best of both worlds-a challenging, high-tech educational foundation in an environment with small classes, accessible professors, and numerous opportunities for real-world research experience.

"Engineering is a space unto itself in college and naturally takes more credits than most other majors," said Peter Sheldon, Randolph's Charles A. Dana Professor and chair of the physics and engineering departments.

"Engineering schools are typically larger, and only a fraction of the students get hands-on opportunities," he added. "Here at Randolph, you are going to get your hands on the equipment. You are going to get those opportunities to do further research and projects beyond the classroom, and there are also great support systems set up to help students succeed."

An interdisciplinary branch of engineering, mechatronics involves mechanical, electrical, and computer engineering. Robotics is a subset of that, focusing on applied systems to design, build, operate and smart

machines.

"Think about how robots work or how motors work," Sheldon explained. "There are physical things that you have to put together to, for instance, move a robotic arm. That's mechanical engineering. Then you've got the electrical components that run the robotic or motor parts, and you use computer engineering to program them to do various tasks."

Mechatronics also plays a big role in industrial engineering, "an industry where you're putting things together and going from raw materials to finished products," he said.

Students will gain a foundation in engineering, computer science, physics, mathematics, and chemistry-and receive hands-on experience with robots from the start.

"We have seen a growing interest in majors such as this and believe offering robotics and mechatronics engineering at Randolph will meet the needs of current and future students," said Travis Carter, dean of admission and financial aid. "This is an exciting addition to our already strong academic program."

The coursework is varied; students will go from studying the chemistry of materials to electronic circuits to computer programming, which will all be brought together in manufacturing and engineering.

They'll finish their degree in four years,

culminating in a capstone project that Sheldon said is "very much in the field, actually producing something that works, likely with partners in the industry."

Those partnerships will be easier to come by in Lynchburg.

"While manufacturing and robotics are big everywhere, this is a particular hotbed for that kind of engineering," Sheldon said. "We are well-situated with a lot of engineering companies and others in the industry, which is one of the reasons why we chose this major. There's going to be a lot of partnership opportunities."

The College has hired two new full-time professors of engineering and is renovating an entire floor in Presser Hall, which will be home to a new teaching lab, research spaces, and machine shop-on top of the ongoing multimillion-dollar renovation of Martin Science Building.

"The engineering program at Randolph is a unique liberal arts experience for those who are not sure where they want to go in the field," said Severin McNulty '27. "There are lots of opportunities to get out there and try new things. The robotics and mechatronics program will add diversity to the department and bring in more staff with unique backgrounds, allowing for a better education for all students."







Science lovers flocked to campus in March for Randolph's 2024 Science Festival, a weekend full of activities presented by the College's sciences, humanities, and arts departments.

One of the College's biggest outreach events, the Science Festival started as Science Day for kids in 2005 and expanded to a full festival in 2009. Each year, it is open and free to the public

Events included the popular Science Day for local youth, an Artificial Intelligence Panel featuring business and education experts, the Maker Faire of Lynchburg, Poetry Jam Reading & Awards Ceremony, two LEGO build competitions, an esports tournament, and the Region 2000 KidWind Challenge.


The annual Women in Science Panel, featuring alumnae pursuing careers in STEM, welcomed back Courtney Carter Plaster '92, Ashleigh Baber '05, Kristina Whately '14, and Bria Carlisle-Thaniel '16.

The College also presented the Science Teaching Award from Randolph (STAR) to E.C. Glass High School biology teacher Erin Rettke.

The centerpiece of the festival was nuclear engineer Grace Stanke's keynote address, which focused on the importance of cleaner energy options and the role they play in protecting the environment.

Stanke, Miss America 2023, also comoderated the festival's popular A Scientist Goes to the Movies alongside professor Peter Sheldon. They offered commentary during the Oscar-winning film, *Oppenheimer*.




























BUILDING INOVATION

Martin Science Building renovation will transform the current facility

Randolph's newest campus project is underway. The major renovation of Martin Science Building began in January.

This phase, which extends through August, includes the installation of new HVAC and elevator systems, the creation of an accessible entrance to Martin on Norfolk Avenue and improved access to the greenhouse and botanic garden areas, and the renovation of laboratory spaces for introductory biology, physics, and organic biochemistry.

The work is expected to be finished in time for the start of the fall 2024 semester.


The project, which the College is undergoing without incurring additional debt, is funded in large part thanks to supportive alumnae, alumni, and friends of the College.

At the beginning of January, Randolph completed a \$250,000 matching challenge grant from the Mary Morton Parsons Foundation and announced a new challenge from an anonymous alumna from the 1970s. That \$200,000 matching challenge must be met by June 30, 2024.

Additionally, Liz Grimm '71, an emerita member of the Board of Trustees, has made a generous commitment to the project to name the organic and biochemistry lab.



FUNDRAISING PROGRESS



As of April 1, the College was \$2.68 million away from reaching the renovation campaign's \$23 million goal.

Built in the late 1930s and named in memory of Fernando Wood Martin, the first scientist on the College's faculty, the 38,000-square-foot Martin Science Building provides a historic setting for Randolph students and faculty.

These upgrades will be an invaluable resource for students in the College's biology, chemistry, physics and engineering, math and computer science, marine science, and environmental studies and sciences programs, as well as the Natural History and Archaeology Collections Project.

While primarily remaining true to its original architecture, the building will undergo an interior transformation, becoming a welcoming space that inspires communication, curiosity, discovery, and innovation.


Renovations will bring the building up to current standards, resulting in a facility that is more comfortable and fully accessible, with better climate control, lighting, and campus integration.

With the addition of the modern technological and scientific resources expected by today's faculty and students, the new facility will highlight Randolph's passion for the sciences.

"Our Randolph College campus community and our wider community of alumnae, alumni, parents, and friends have been wonderfully supportive of this campaign to renovate our Martin Science Building," said President Sue Ott Rowlands. "This project will provide a modernized center fully equipped with instrumentation and technology for highly collaborative scientific studies and research in the 21st century. We are grateful for the generosity of our donors who are an integral part of bringing this transformation to fruition and helping our students become the next generation of scientists for our world."









And now, she's tackling going back to school—as one of the first students in Randolph's new Master of Education program.

While Randolph's Master of Arts in Teaching degree is focused on helping teachers earn licensure, the MEd, which is being offered online, is designed as an opportunity for those who may not want to teach in public K-12 schools, but still want advanced study in education.

"In our department, we recognize education as a lifelong pursuit that happens in many spaces: arts centers, afterschool and summer programs, camps, museums, and so many more places," said education professor Crystal Howell. "In addition to extensive experience in schools, our faculty have created curricula and taught in these nontraditional settings, and we regularly work with local organizations."

The goal is to prepare graduates to not only plan and deliver engaging programming but also to evaluate their program's success and engage in continuous improvement.

"This emphasis on action research—that is, the kind of critical self-assessment nonprofits and community organizations engage in continuously to make their programs better fit the needs of their communities—is one of

the many things that sets our MEd apart from other programs," Howell said.

Hall applied for the MEd to enhance the Academy's arts programming with an educational focus, aiming to support students of all ages.

"I'm an arts administrator, and I really want to ensure we are providing a level of excellence in education that supports the city schools in a way that is very intentional," she said. "It's one thing to look at programming through the eyes of a teacher, or an arts educator with a specialty in a specific discipline, versus being inside of the school system as an administrator.

"It's looking at arts administration and school administration, where they overlap and where there are opportunities for more connection," she added. "Having an understanding of that is helpful, so you're asking the right questions. I aspire for our partnership to be strong and supportive for educators and students alike."

She's spent a lot of time examining the SOLS to break out objectives and develop curriculum, while also understanding budget constraints that school systems often face.

"As a person who has always been in the arts, I understand when you have things being stretched and budgets being cut," she said. "I want to be in a position at the Academy where no matter what the school's budget, we can supply robust, engaging, and worthwhile programming for students and teachers and really be a resource."

She's also working on an action research project that feeds into her work and has already brought ideas back to her team.

"Michelline's study enhances her contributions at the Academy Center of the Arts and throughout the Lynchburg community," said Peggy Schimmoeller, education professor and director of the College's MEd and MAT programs. "We love having her as a member of our learning community. She will undoubtedly continue to make significant contributions as she applies what she has learned."

The program has been a perfect fit for Hall's busy life as a working mom and active volunteer. She is president of the Junior League of Lynchburg—only the second Black president in the organization's history—and serves on numerous boards around town.

"The support of the faculty and staff at Randolph is top-notch," she said. "They are very understanding of working families and are attentive to the shifting priorities that may happen in a day or a series of weeks. I definitely feel their support in this."

Randolph remembers presidents
Robert Atwood Spivey and Kathleen Gill Bowman,
who passed away in 2023





= Robert Atwood Spivey (1978-1987) =

Robert Atwood Spivey, who served as the College's sixth president, passed away on Dec. 12, 2023. He was 92.

During Spivey's tenure from 1978 to 1987, the College graduated the largest class in its history up to that point. He placed great emphasis on writing for students in all fields of study and greatly valued the College's art collection.

The College Art Gallery was renovated in 1981 and renamed the Maier Museum of Art at Randolph College in recognition of an endowment established in 1983 by the Sarah and Pauline Maier Scholarship Foundation.

Under his leadership, the College also established the Harriet Hudson Scholarship for non-traditional age students and a minority task force to improve support of Black students.

After his tenure as president, Spivey was appointed chancellor and helped lead the College's Second Century Campaign.

He was predeceased by his wife of 62 years, Martha Crocker Spivey '54, who was a music major. The couple had

three children and numerous grandchildren and greatgrandchildren.

A native of Suffolk, Virginia, Spivey graduated from Duke

University in 1953. He also earned his bachelor of divinity degree from Union Theological Seminary and a PhD in philosophy from Yale

University.

In addition to being a Fulbright Scholar, he taught at Yale, Williams College, and Florida State University, where he helped found the Department of Religion. After serving as chair of that department for seven years, he was made provost and then dean of the College of Arts & Sciences until assuming leadership at the College.

The author of several scholarly books on religion, Spivey served as president of the Virginia Foundation for Independent Colleges from 1988 to 1998 before moving back to Florida. He then worked with the FSU Foundation and held the position of ombudsman until 2014. He was also a volunteer with the Quest Life Skills program for inmates for 20 years.

Kathleen Gill Bowman (1994-2006) =

Athleen Gill Bowman, eighth president of Randolph-Macon Woman's College, passed away on Tuesday, Nov. 21, 2023. She was 80.

Bowman served as president of the College from 1994 to 2006.

A Fulbright scholar to Japan and Korea, Bowman emphasized international programs and cooperation and was committed to understanding the effects of social and racial bias in education.

During her tenure behind the Red Brick Wall, the College increased its enrollment of international students and strengthened its Asian, international studies, and science programs.

Other accomplishments during Bowman's time as president included the creation of the Pearl S.
Buck Award, the President's Award for Globalization, and the Susan F. Davenport Global Leadership Program, as well as the establishment of the College's Summer Research Program,

Presidential Scholars Program, environmental studies and American culture majors, graduate programs in education, and interdisciplinary first-year experience courses.

Bowman was a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University of Minnesota, where she also earned a PhD in

English education.

Before assuming the presidency, she served as vice provost for international affairs at the University of Oregon from 1989 to 1994 and as its associate vice president for research from 1985 to 1989.

In 1993, she was a Fulbright scholar to Japan and Korea, where she studied recent reforms in the higher education systems of both countries.

Prior to her work at Oregon,
Bowman served as a faculty member and
special assistant to the president of Reed College, where she
also directed the development of programs for gifted precollegiate students and two graduate programs.



Q: What is your fondest memory?

My lifelong relationship with my major professor, Dr. David Anthony. Although I never really used my Asian studies/political science major professionally, I've always had a passion for Asian culture: literature, art, philosophy, cuisine.

"Uncle Dave," as we called him, was a largerthan-life academic with a gift of humor and entertainment that made his classes—and interactions with him post-college—more than memorable.

His death in 2000 sparked a self-reassessment of my life when I realized I had been too wrapped up in a stressful and demanding career to focus on family and friends who really mattered to me.

I scheduled a visit to David's widow, Laura—who would become a very close friend of mine until her own death—coupled with some informational interviews that she arranged to explore the possibility of leaving Washington D.C. and returning to my alma mater to work.

Thus, within a year of those interviews, I was hired as a major gifts officer and made the big switch from corporate D.C. life to a nine-year career raising funds for the College.

Q: Why did you choose to support the College with a planned gift?

I learned during my years working at the College about the importance of regular, annual giving combined with periodic larger gifts to commemorate reunions or to support capital campaigns. The third leg of giving is an "ultimate gift" that adds to or establishes your legacy.

While working at the College from 2001-2009, I befriended and became "Auntie Stacy" to scores of students, most of whom were internationals, and with some of whom I've remained friends to this day. These friendships opened up a whole new world to me and helped to make my life at Randolph a much richer experience—full of joy and purpose.

One of the students I befriended was the late Kobra Ahmadi '10, a brilliant young refugee from Afghanistan. Her passion for learning, ambition to travel and make a difference, and her determination to be an example to others following in her footsteps was remarkable to me. That she died so young was shattering to the College community, but through her I stayed in touch with her young husband, Jawed Nader, and Susan Lemly Sardina '70, who had been

instrumental in getting Kobra to Randolph.

When Afghanistan fell to the Taliban in August 2021, Kobra and her husband's families were able to escape, and I connected with and became close to the two daughters of her brother, Somaya and Parwin.

Both Somaya's and Parwin's dream was to pick up where they left off at university in Kabul. Their ultimate dream was to attend Aunt Kobra's alma mater. With that inspiration and that goal in mind, Susan Sardina, Susan Braselton Fant '84, and I teamed up to create a scholarship for displaced and refugee students who could not ordinarily afford the expense of a private, liberal arts college. We managed to raise enough funds to send Parwin to Randolph, where she is flourishing as a first-year student, for one year. The "Susans" and I will continue to fundraise to get Parwin through to graduation. Then we hope to recruit more qualified students.

It dawned on me in the process of creating this fund that I would be able to endow it through my estate. Since the College was already in my will, it was relatively easy to redirect my intentions to the scholarship in Kobra's memory. And hopefully it will secure funds to future students for years to come, thus my "ultimate gift."







Diane "Misty" Matthews Walker '74, Katharine "Kitty" Stark Caldwell '74, and the late Sallie Crosby Smith '64 were recognized with the award, which is given each year to graduates who personify the value of a liberal arts education. The ceremony was held in May during Reunion.

SALLIE CROSBY SMITH '64

Smith, who died in October, was a dedicated educator, volunteer, and activist who was passionate about education, diversity, equity, community, and environmental safety.

A lifelong learner and gifted teacher, she studied sociology at the College and earned her master's degree from the University of Delaware.

Her career in education included teaching, and later serving as elementary school director, for the Pilot School, an innovative school for children with learning challenges in Delaware; teaching English in an evening high school equivalent program; and serving as president of the Nursery Kindergarten Association of Delaware.

She also built a library and taught life skills classes at an adult minimum security

prison in Wilmington.

Throughout her career, she was awarded the Adult and Community Educator of the Year Award from the state of Delaware,

and the Reading Achievement Award from the International Reading

Association.

After retiring in 2004, she started her own tutoring business, Unlocking Potential, in Fairhope, Alabama, and founded Read Aloud Baldwin, a program that arranged for volunteers to read to preschoolers and kindergarteners in her community.

Social justice issues were close to her heart. In Delaware, she established a library of children's books in a women's prison, so incarcerated mothers could read to their children during visits. She was involved in the founding of Hope Community, a Fairhope, Alabama, nonprofit with a mission to nurture unity and human rights through relationships and interactive education, and was a member of her church's Path to Peace ministry.

While battling cancer, Smith started the Coal Ash Action Committee, created to address a longstanding environmental threat to the watershed of Mobile Bay as well as to work toward the safe disposal of coal ash and the implementation of protective regulations.

The group successfully lobbied for the Environmental Protection Agency to end coal ash containment in the Mobile River and Tensaw River Delta. Their efforts were recognized in 2023 with the Annual Watershed Award, given by Mobile Bay Magazine to recognize environmental quardians.

DIANE "MISTY" MATTHEWS WALKER '74

Walker is a longtime community leader, volunteer, and fundraiser who has spent her life championing children and mental health programs.

A recipient of the Virginia Center for Inclusive Communities' Humanitarian Award, she was one of the visionaries behind the creation of Amazement Square, a nationally recognized children's museum in downtown Lynchburg.

She is also a founding board member of the Crisis Line of Central Virginia, the Child Sexual Assault Task Force, the Coalition for the Prevention of Substance Abuse, and Lynchburg Grows.

Walker, who studied psychology at the College, earned her master's degree and PhD in child psychology from the University of Kentucky. After her master's degree, she took a job implementing the Education for All Handicapped Children Act in the Appalachian region of Kentucky.

She later founded and taught a two-year course training guidance counselors in that area on how

to assess student needs and implement appropriate learning strategies.

Upon moving back to Lynchburg, Walker set up the Children's Mental Health Program at the Central Virginia Community Services Board. She supervised therapists and provided

consultation with local schools, social service systems, and juvenile court facilities.

She is a Eucharistic minister for St. John's Episcopal Church and has also served with Meals on Wheels, Big Brothers and Big Sisters, Family Services, Seven Hills School, and James River Day School.

In 2000, she received the YWCA's Women of Achievement Award. In addition, in 2002, she was named Outstanding Volunteer Fundraiser by the Lynchburg Association of Fundraising Professionals.

KATHARINE "KITTY" STARK CALDWELL '74

Alover of the arts, Caldwell has embraced the College's motto, *Vita abundantior*, and served as a leader for numerous organizations. She has also helped guide the advisory committee for the Maier Museum of Art at Randolph College over the years.

A dedicated community leader, she founded the Passport Scholars Program, which gives low-income students in Hamilton County, Tennessee, the opportunity to travel abroad or engage in summer enrichment activities. She ran the program for six years, and it then became a part of the Public Education Foundation of Chattanooga for the next 14 years.

She has also volunteered as a director for the Allied Arts of Greater Chattanooga, the Boys and Girls Club of Chattanooga, and the private Girls Preparatory School.

She served on the board for the Hunter Museum of American Art–where she chaired the acquisitions committee and initiated a Chairman's Circle group

whose members provide vital support to the museum—as well as Chattanooga's Public Education Fund and Women's Fund.

Caldwell is a former trustee for the College and served from 2002 to 2012. In addition, she chaired the Institutional Advancement and Membership/Trusteeship Committees.

In 2022, she and her husband, Hacker, received the Ruth Holmberg Arts Leadership Award, which recognizes individuals who have made significant contributions to the arts in Chattanooga and who are actively engaged in its cultural life.

Her ties to Randolph remain strong. She's a member of the Vita Abundantior Society, and in 2016, gifted the labyrinth to the College.

In 2011, Randolph dedicated Caldwell Commons in her honor in recognition of her longtime support and service. The same year, she helped fund the creation of an illustrated book documenting 100 years of the College's Annual Exhibition of Contemporary Art.


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Congratulations to Randolph's Pearl S. Buck Award Recipient

JETSUN PEMA

Jetsun Pema, the younger sister of His Holiness the 14th Dalai Lama, was the recipient of Randolph College's Pearl S. Buck Award in April.

The award–given to women who exemplify the ideals, values, and commitments of Buck, a member of the Class of 1914 and the first American woman to receive the Nobel Prize for Literature–was reinstituted this spring.

Pema has dedicated her life to educating Tibetan children in exile.

She served as president of the Tibetan Children's Villages, which take in and care for orphaned, destitute, and refugee children, from 1964 to 2006, and has been recognized as the "Mother of Tibet" by the Tibetan Parliament-in-Exile.

"We are so honored to award Jetsun Pema with the Pearl S. Buck Award this year for her advocacy and support of the children's villages in Tibet," said President Sue Ott Rowlands. "I cannot think of a more worthy recipient given Pearl S. Buck's dedication to children and education in China."
